

## Summary of First Aid Uses for the Scout Neckerchief

The Scout Neckerchief may be used:

1. For the "Fireman's Drag."
2. For the Tied Hands Carry.
3. For "Fireman's Carry."
4. For carrying patient with a chest wound.
5. " " " with a foot wound or other injury, and no chest wound.
6. For tying litter poles together to make a stretcher.
7. For making a horse litter and travois—Indian style.
8. For making a tourniquet to stop hemorrhage.
9. As a temporary pad placed against a wound to stop bleeding.
10. As a bandage for a wound of the head, without covering top of head.
11. As a bandage to cover one ear.
12. " " " to cover one eye.
13. As a Trench or Tommy Atkins bandage.
14. As a bandage for both eyes.
15. " " " for both ears.
16. " " " for the nose.
17. " " " for both cheeks.
18. " " " for a broken jaw.
19. To take the place of the four-tail bandage—using two neckerchiefs.
20. For a shoulder bandage.
21. As a bandage for neck or chest.
22. " " " for fractured ribs.
23. " " " for a broken collar bone.
24. " " splint for a broken collar bone.
25. As an arm sling (regular).
26. " a modified sling—for chafed shoulder.
27. " narrow cravat sling.
28. " burned hand bandage.
29. " boxing glove bandage of hand.
30. " figure 8 bandage of hand palm.
31. " " " " " " " knuckles.
32. " " " " " " " elbow.
33. " (2) narrow cravat ties for upper arm splint.
34. " padding for splints.
35. For (3) forearm splints.
36. " (7) immobilizing entire side.
37. " (4) immobilizing knee cap.
38. " (4 to 5) fracture of leg.
39. " (1) pad and (1) to cover knee.
40. As sprained ankle or snow-shoe hitch (1).
41. " foot bandage or Army sock.
42. " figure 8 for splint for foot.
43. " spica bandage of the hip (2).
44. " cloth pads for hot or cold applications.
45. " sun shelter for injured persons awaiting transport.
46. " tie to fasten hands across overturned canoe.
47. " covering for open wound (or wet pad.)
